FROM THE ARTISTIC DIRECTOR



One in six American women will experience an attempted or completed sexual assault in their lifetime. Additionally, 3% of men in the U.S. have experienced an attempted or completed sexual assault, and

there is evidence that is also closer to one in six as well. Often these incidents go unreported or uninvestigated. When charges are filed and these cases are covered in the media, we think immediately of the survivor and the offender. We wonder how anyone could perpetrate such violence and consider how difficult it must be for a survivor to endure this trauma, report it, and then find a way to move on with their life.

Yet there are other questions that perhaps aren't asked as often. What is the impact on the community at large and what real steps can be taken towards prevention before attempted sexual violence occurs? What are the ripple effects on the families of both the survivor and perpetrator? What warning signs or behavior did those close to the offender miss? While it might be natural to worry about an act of violence happening to someone you love, how often do we consider the thought of someone we're close to committing such an appalling act?

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These next level questions are part of what is explored in Selina Fillinger's intimate and extraordinary new play SOMETHING CLEAN. How does one deal with this specific type of grief - a grief mixed with guilt, complicity, and shame? It's intriguing and illuminating to think about how one responds to these feelings. Do we withdraw and hide? Or do we pursue a course of action that might relieve our conscience in some small way? While our mind is spinning, trying to understand how a person we love could do something so horrendous, can we begin to recognize the seemingly small acts and contributing factors that lead to such a destructive incident? These are just some of the important questions this superb script poses.

Please join us in expressing our gratitude to our partners at the Cleveland Rape Crisis Center who are collaborating on this production as part of Dobama's Full Circle program. Their consultation in the rehearsal room helped ensure that this story is told authentically, and their work in Northeast Ohio is vital to combating violence in our community. The Playwrights' GYM is Dobama Theatre's playwrights' unit. The GYM is a program that provides local playwrights with the opportunity to workshop new work. GYM playwrights are area professionals who are given various resources to help further their work, including rehearsal space, collaboration with a director to assist the playwright, marketing and public events supported by the theatre. The GYM's goal is to nurture new work in a safe environment.

THE GYM HAS TWO PARTS

Full-length Readings: lightly staged readings of full plays are conducted in the theatre or in Dobama's 2nd Floor Arts Space. These are scheduled throughout the season.

GYM Shorts: a showcase of new short works or excerpts from full-length plays by GYM playwrights are read in an annual event usually in January or February.

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

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
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












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
